# **PARTIAL TRUANCY**

Partial Truancy is still a big problem in many schools. Mr Fara (Deputy Principal) was interviewed to explain to us what partial truancy is and how badly it affects school life and grades.

# What is partial truancy?

When a student decides to skip a class without permission. This can be because of the workload, bullying in the class or a dislike for the subject.

# What are the consequences of partial truancy?

The consequences depend on the amount of times the student has truanted. The first time the student truants, it is up to the teacher to catch up with the student and it is up to the student to catch up on their work. The second time the student skips class it is up to the Head Teacher of that department to hand out detentions to that student. If truancy continues, the Year Advisers will then give the student pre-suspension warnings and if truancy still continues, the student will be suspended.

# Why isn't partial truancy good?

Every time a student skips class, they are impacting on their learning, which becomes a major problem in senior years as they have "gaps" in their learning and the students do not know how to do certain areas of certain subjects. Truanting does impact on students educations very seriously, as seen in senior years by teachers.

# Any advice for people who considering truanting?

If you are considering truancy, speak to your Year Advisers or any other staff member. They are here to help you whenever you need it and are happy to assist you with these problems. Don't hold all the problems in. Come forward and the problems will be dealt with accordingly.

If you have any other issues whatsoever with your classes, it is highly recommended that you either speak about it to your teacher or your Year Adviser, as they are here to help you through your school life.

#### **Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on**

# School Students with Disability Notification for Parents and Carers

From 2015, all Government and non-Government schools across Australia are required to participate annually in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

All Australian schools will collect data on their students who are receiving adjustments to meet additional learning and support needs in accordance with their obligations under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and *Disability Standards for Education 2005*. This data will be provided to the Australian Government to assist in the development of a consistent, national picture of the education needs of students with disability.

The data provided to the Australian Government by the NSW Department of Education and Communities is provided in such a way that it cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

#### **Privacy Protection**

The NSW Department of Education and Communities follows the requirements of the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* and the *Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002*. Schools will collect, record, store and use data about individual students in line with these requirements. Data security and protection is a priority and students' personal details will be kept confidential.

Under Clause 52 of the Commonwealth *Australian Education Regulation 2013*, data collected by the NSW Department of Education and Communities for the NCCD must be provided to the Australian Government Department of Education and Training. This includes the number of students at each level of education, the number in each category of disability and the number at each level of adjustment. The information is provided to the Commonwealth as a series of number sets that cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

The Australian Government Department of Education and Training follows the requirements of the Commonwealth *Privacy Act 1988* when handling any data provided by NSW Department of Education and Communities in connection with the national data collection. A privacy notice has been developed to by the Australian Government to provide students, parents and carers with important privacy information in relation to the data collection. It is an innovative and convenient way for teachers to communicate with students and parents about daily homework requirements, assessment tasks, exams and other relevant events. It is a smart phone application which allows you to receive daily homework, assessment due dates and exam dates, directly to your smartphone. Parents/students can synchronise them to their calendar and receive regular alerts before they are due. Additionally Assessment Alert allows schools to send messages to your smartphone regarding any important information.

The app is FREE to download and use and we encourage all families to make use of this fantastic communication tool.

If you have an iPhone, iPad or iTouch simply go to <u>App Store</u> or if you have an Android device visit the <u>Google Play Store</u> and follow the prompts.

It is simple, easy to use and will help students and parents become more organised and engaged with their studies. To download and use the app is FREE.
