Day Structure Review Outcomes 2020+

The School Development Day (Monday 22nd July) was devoted to the finalisation of our consultation process on the MGHS Day Structure for 2020 and beyond.

Again, I thank all members of the school community who contributed to our surveys and meetings. The data gathered was analysed by the MGHS Day Structure Committee (18 staff members across all faculties) and informed our new structure to be implemented in 2020.

In 2020, MGHS will change our curriculum delivery to accommodate a greater focus on Teaching & Learning. In reducing the number of periods in the day, we will; increase the effective teaching time in each lesson, reduce the time lost to transitions between lessons and reduce the number of lessons post-lunch, limiting end-of-day distractions.

Bell Times

- 5 periods per day Two periods before Lunch 1, two periods between Lunch 1 and Lunch 2, and a single period after Lunch 2.
- School hours will change, resulting in school finishing 9 minutes earlier: 9am to 3:10 pm (Mon, Wed, Thurs, Fri) & 9am 3:00pm (Tues)
- The day begins with Period 1 rather than Assembly, so punctuality is necessary.
- Recess & Lunch will be called Lunch 1 and Lunch 2. Both breaks will be 30 minutes.
- Early finish Tuesday afternoons (following sport) 3:00pm to cater for staff professional Learning meetings.
- 2 week cycle will be implemented. Week A and Week B will alternate throughout the term, with each term commencing Week A.

Year 11 & 12 – All subjects will change from 9 periods per fortnight to 7 periods. However, curriculum patterns will not change; in fact, the timetable changes will improve the delivery of students' current choices through the increase to effective learning time.

Focusing on Student Wellbeing

Our new day structure will also feature a focus on the wellbeing of every child.

The Wellbeing Program sees all school teaching staff engage with students in a pastoral care style period once a fortnight (40 minutes).

Throughout the Wellbeing Program, students will work with a teacher on aspects of education involving resilience, time management, decision-making as well as mental health issues and personal wellbeing. Focusing on mental health in schools is not just about helping students who are having specific mental health concerns; it is about helping all students to achieve their best.

Some of the benefits of focusing on mental health are:

- sense of connectedness
- academic success
- social development
- personal resilience
- capacity to work with others and in the workplace.

The Wellbeing period will be preceded by Year Meetings for each cohort (20 minutes).

Focussing on Pedagogy

From 2020 onwards, it is expected that all teachers align their lessons to the MGHS Learning Framework. We strive for engaged learners who achieve impressive outcomes. A major benefit of our new structure is to allow our teachers to dedicate their lessons to developing future focused learners. Our new structure will focus on the skill development of students and less on teacher led instruction and content delivery. Lessons will include greater opportunities for teamwork, collaboration, discussion and hands-on activities.

I'm pleased to say that the MGHS Learning Framework is being developed by four committed executive members. Their extensive expertise, gained across many schools will aid them to devise our framework, which will result in greater consistency for our students across all areas of the curriculum. The framework will also provide a powerful scaffold for teachers to structure lessons.

Sport

Overwhelming feedback has been heard. Sport for Years 8 to 10 will return to Tuesday afternoons, allowing a greater variety of sports, plus student choice. Year 7 students will have sport integrated into PE lessons throughout their timetable. The integration of Year 7 Sport, plus the delivery of this sport by PE teachers will allow a greater focus on skills development, participation and enjoyment, prior to them embarking on whole-school sport from Year 8.

SPORTS REPORT

There has been a lot of action on the fields and courts at Grossmann to start Term 3. The Premier's Sporting Challenge has begun for students in Year 7 and Elective PE subjects this term, with over 430 students participating. Most students will complete their tracking in their regular PE lessons, and is a good reminder to take advantage of the warm winter weather and enjoy a range of recreational and sporting options available.

The Regional Athletics Carnival was held in week 2 of Term 3. A change of format saw the 2-day event reduce to 1 day of competition at Glendale Sporting Complex. MGHS had 39 athletes qualify for the regional competition, with 3 students progressing to the CHS State Athletics Carnival later this term. Congratulations to, Sophie Sorensen, Zoey Kinch and Sam Turner who will represent MGHS at Homebush.

Emily Latter also represented MGHS at the Eastern Creek cross country track at the end of week 1. Emily competed in the CHS State event and should be proud of her achievements as she ran against a high level of competition.

Our CHS Knockout teams are continuing to achieve very pleasing results. The U/15 Bill Turner Cup team travelled to Forster in week two, competing against a strong side from Great Lakes College. After a tough game, the girls were unfortunately beaten 3-1, however, this was not reflective of how close the game played out. Our U/15 Boys and Girls basketball teams have progressed to the Hunter stage of the knockout competition after a strong showing at the Coalfields Gala day earlier in the term. Meanwhile, a range of touch football and AFL teams will be beginning side selections in the coming weeks for a range of competitions this term and next.

The annual Year 7 Coalfields Gala day will be held in Week 9 this term, with final preparations being organised with the conveners in the coming weeks. More information regarding organisation and notes will be distributed to Year 7 students soon.

Stage 5 students please don't forget to make payment to the front office for any outstanding bus fees – that includes Terms 1 and 2. Term 4 sport selections for Stage 5 will be coming up in Week 8, so please ensure all accounts are finalised as students who have not completed all payments for Terms 1 to 3 will be ineligible to select an external sport.

PDHPE REPORT

The PDHPE faculty is a busy place at this time of year. Not only have Stage 4 and Stage 5 PDHPE students been carving up the dance floor, but we've had Year 12 PDHPE students complete their Trial HSC Examination and Year 10 PASS / 11 PDHPE students spend some time at the snow.

Stage 4 and Stage 5 PDHPE students are working hard through their theoretical components of the course. Year 7 are working through the Understanding Me (Puberty) Unit, Year 9 completing the Knowing Narcotics (Drugs) Unit and Years 8 and 10 taking a look at Road Safety from different angles.

Year 12 PDHPE students complete their Trial HSC Examination in the designated Trial period. Upon receiving their results, they are straight back into the content. We are already so proud of this cohort and their work ethic and attitudes to learning.










SCIENCE FACULTY

GATS Workshops in CAPA

In Term 2 Week 10 The Creative and Performing Arts Department (CAPA) at Maitland Grossmann High School coordinated a series of TALENTED STUDENT WORKSHOPS with a focus on providing opportunities for our talented Year 8 students.

Students were invited to participate in activities organised by our specialist teachers in Music, Drama, Visual Arts/Design Photography. The series of specialist workshops culminated in an exhibition and performance evening on Thursday 4th July.

Artworks from across all year groups were exhibited and students performed for the invited guests. Our focus was to elevate student achievement and recognise their accomplishments through collaboration and dedication.

The CAPA subjects have achieved at a consistently high standard at regional and state events, with representation in ensembles, exhibitions and NESA Showcase events.

Our department has been successful with students' selection for Encore, ArtExpress and HSC showcase events, with 18 Band 6 results in the past 4 years, including First in State in Visual Arts. These are reflective of the calibre of students and excellence of our staff.

Teachers coordinated a range of tutors and resources for the activities from internationally recognised vocal and drama coaches to local mentoring from tutors and our own highly experienced staff. The 4th July event was an opportunity to celebrate with the school community. Over 200 parents and friends attended, giving them the opportunity recognise the students' achievements and successes in Creative and Performing Arts.





Visual Arts GATS Workshop - Mr Focic

Selected Year 8 students were invited to participate in an intensive Street Art Style Self-Portrait workshop for the day. Students were photographed prior to the day and their portraits manipulated in Photoshop to create a simpler black and white image. This image was then used to create a stencil, which on the day, students cut out with stencil knives. This all had to remain in one piece which the students found quite challenging! Students then used brightly coloured spray paints and a variety of other pre-cut patterned stencils to create backgrounds for their portraits. Students were shown how to use spray cans to achieve various effects such as tonal and colour blends. When their backgrounds had dried they sprayed their portrait stencil over the top with a darker colour to help it stand out from the background. Students found the project quite challenging and intensive but managed to achieve very impressive results. Students should be commended on their creativity and mature approach to this workshop. I look forward to running similar workshops in the future.





Visual Design Gates Workshop - Mr Pratt

The Visual Design workshop provided students with opportunities to explore the links between art and design by designing compositions based on Russian Constructivist design concepts, which were investigated in the introduction to the workshop. These constructivist designs incorporated geometric shapes and pattern, which were transferred onto coffee mugs. The arrangement of shapes and colour in the design considered balance and aesthetic qualities with thought to object restraints and function.

















Drama Report and GATS Workshops

Term 2 and 3 have been exciting ones for Drama enthusiasts across the school. Indigenous and non-indigenous students performed a self-devised dramatic piece based on this year's theme "Truth. Treaty. Voice" at the NAIDOC celebrations. It touched on aspects of the indigenous experience as seen through indigenous students' experiences and highlighted just some of the contributions of the indigenous community.





GATS week saw students from Years 8, 10, 11 and 12 participate in workshops with Callan Purcell. Callan is a Novocastrian who graduated from the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama, London in 2018. Dame Judi Dench, Jennifer Saunders and Carrie Fisher are fellow graduates of this prestigious school so we were very fortunate to have Callan with us. Callan worked with students over a two day period to show them some of the skills in creating theatre that will assist them as they advance towards HSC Drama. The year 8, 10 and 11 groups performed at the GATS night showcase.




Theatre sports is slowly building throughout the school with a regular core of 18 to 25 students turning up weekly to engage in mighty improvisation battles against each other. These skills are beneficial to students in so many ways across 21st century learning. As the students work in teams, they develop collaborative, critical reflection and communication skills. These are the skills cited by the 2015 report by the "Committee for Economic Development Australia" as skills which were unlikely to be replaced by automation. Skills that currently cannot be replaced by computers.

When the test day arrived I was a bit nervous at the start but when I just sat down and took some deep breaths and I managed to stay calm. The test was not easy. I had a few troublesome questions to answer. I did the best I could.

We had to overcome many challenges and obstacles. My advice is don't get overwhelmed by the exams. My experience was good and yet a bit scary sometimes. I didn't let that take control of me.

In return, we ask that you tap on and tap off every time when travelling on public transport to and from school.



Tap on and tap off your School Opal card every time





It is a condition of the School Pass Terms and the Student Codes of Conduct when travelling that students in possession of the School Opal card must tap on and tap off every time when using public transport to travel to and from school. Per section 3.2 of the Opal Privacy Policy, Transport for NSW collects information from taps on and taps off to support coordination, planning and policy development for transport, transport services and transport infrastructure.

The School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.



If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

If the student already has a School Opal card and is changing schools, campuses or home address, you will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

How to apply

Applications for next year open at the start of Term 4 this year.

Once the new school has confirmed your child's enrolment, complete the application at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

Step 2

The school endorses your application.

Once Transport for NSW has approved the application, a School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.



A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over can apply for themselves.

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits


